Dear St. Peter's,

Yesterday we baptized Christopher Repp—it was a glorious day! Baptisms seem to be the time and place when the Church is most truly that which she was created to be; we who are gathered in the pews know our calling more fully and truthfully in that moment than we do in any other. So often we think of baptism as a set of promises taken on by the person who is being baptized, or by the family of an infant or child who is too young to speak for themselves. And, yes, there is some real truth in that perspective. But, more importantly, baptism is about the promises we take on as a church community.

William Willimon is a well-known bishop in the United Methodist Church; currently, he is the Professor of the Practice of Christian Ministry at Duke Divinity School. In his book *Remember Who You Are: Baptism, a Model for Christian Life*, he explains the responsibility of the baptizers in this way:

It is the church which was told to "Go, make disciples...baptizing...teaching." The church bears the task of making disciples, not individuals. Baptism is the church's proclamation and experience that we are who we are because God has first chosen us and loved us and called us into his Kingdom. The burden of baptism is more on the baptizers than the ones being baptized.

Sometimes I think that we in the church shift the burden of baptism off our backs and onto the backs of the persons being baptized because we doubt that we have the ability to be God's instruments in the task of "making disciples." We doubt that God could use people like us to convert other people. We tell the person being baptized [or the parents] that it is all up to them. This is not only irresponsible but biblically indefensible. It is the church which has been entrusted with the task of making disciples. Christianity is not a do-it-yourself, home correspondence course in salvation. My salvation is always a gift, something which is received from God and from God working through other people.¹

At baptism, more than any other time, we are hit between the eyes with the tremendous responsibility that we, as a community of those who have been baptized and are now the baptizers, bear each and every time we gather for baptism. In the sacred proclamation that we belong to God—each and every one of us, claimed as God's very own—we also realize our call to figure out *together* what it means to live as God's people in the here and now, what it looks like to follow Jesus.

There is a moment in the service when we are asked if we will support the person who is being baptized in their life in Christ, and we as a church family reply "We will" with vigor and affection. That moment is not disconnected from the other moments in our life together—from the gathering for bible study, or volunteering in the food pantry, or chaperoning a youth trip, or providing rides for parishioners who are unable to drive, or giving generously of our money so that we can afford educational materials for our children and nursery workers for our infants. All of these things are included in those two words: "We will."

As a community, may we bear that responsibility with joy, love, and grace.

Vestry Summary

July 27, 2014

Attendees: Liz Larson, Carolyn Scott, Kitson Roger, Jerry Adams, Teri Daily, Sylvia Walker, Kelley King, John Shute, Jerusalem Greer, Jeanetta Darley, Warren Readnour, Scotty Bell

Approval of Minutes from Last Meeting: Jerry made a motion that we accept minutes with changes. The motion was seconded and all approved.

Welcome Jerusalem: Teri Daily.

Committee and Ministry Reports

1. **Finance Committee:** John Shute presented financial statements on behalf of the Finance Committee. Pledges for operations are basically on track. Non-pledged gifts have gone down @ \$8K from last year. The amount placed in the budget for this category is an estimate, an average. Repairs and Maintenance: most of this figure consists of the new roof and a/c repairs. Capital Campaign spreadsheet: some adjustments will be made to bring us up to date. We are currently approximately halfway through the three year campaign.

Inadvertently, we have not been pulling out of the Capital Campaign Fund all of money that was designated for operational expenses each month. (In other words, we've been covering some expenses without the need for Capital Campaign funds.) Teri asked the vestry if, going forward, we want to pull out what was originally designated, or what we are exactly using to pay Jerusalem package. The decision was made to transfer the funds needed for Jerusalem's package from Capital Campaign funds to operations each month, and we will revisit this issue should finances become tight. Scotty made a motion to accept financials as presented. The motion was seconded and all approved.

2. **Youth, Children and Family Ministry:** Jerusalem Greer. We are going to try something called Family Formation this fall, and this will occur in the parish hall each week. This is an intergenerational class. The curriculum is called Whirl, and it follows the Lectionary. The goal is to teach about the Lectionary, the liturgical calendar and why we do what we do as Episcopalians. After a short breakfast and activity, people will break into age-appropriate groups. The benefit with this program is that families will be together, and to help us feel as one. There will be a video demonstration at the upcoming Ministry Fair.

EYC will now be meeting back in the Parish Hall. The back yard is also going to be cleaned up to be used.

A Children, Youth and Family Calendar will be put together instead of separate calendars. Also, the Family Sunday ministry team will take over one Sunday a month.

There will be some changes in the classrooms: children will go back to using the two joining classrooms next to the library, and the other classrooms will be used for adult classes. With this said, rooms will need to be painted and the white board will need to be moved. Also, Teri would like to take the bulletin boards down in the hallway and have the walls painted. This is long overdue. Scotty said that he can get another white board for us, so the other one won't have to be

moved. The vestry also discussed time frame, and hiring someone to come in and do the painting.

Old/Continuing Business Items

- 1. Courtyard Update:** Warren Readnour. Plans are moving forward, but nothing visible has been done. Steve Hurd's architectural drawings need to be entered into the church's database. There have been some concerns that the marble block under the tree has shifted, and it has been requested that when it is re-placed, that its orientation be changed.
- 2. Kitchen Update:** Sylvia Walker. The kitchen is looking amazing, and is almost complete. Walls have been washed down, the stove is being cleaned and Dale is putting tile up as a back splash. 99% of the project should be done by the end of next week.
- 3. Ministry Fair:** August 24th.

Rector's Report:

- 1. Morgan House Mission Statement:** Now that we have been living with the renovated property for about a year, some guidelines need to be put down on paper. A committee will be working on a written mission statement. The committee consists of Warren Readnour, Amanda Moore, Carolyn Scott, Jay McDaniel, Merry Helen Hedges, Jerusalem Greer and Teri Daily. First meeting will be August 14th.
- 2. Stewardship:** Our campaign this year: Walking the Way. Jerry, Warren and Teri will be studying material later this week.
- 3. EfM Update:** Nita Brown will mentor the Monday evening group. The Monday afternoon class is already maxed out.
- 4. Robert R. Brown Camp: August 3-7** Teri will be participating this week at Robert R. Brown Camp at Camp Mitchell.
- 5. Jerusalem's Package:** St. Peter's will be helping the Greers with moving expenses for their move to Conway.
- 6. Vestry Retreat :** "Living on the Border of the Holy" by William Countryman has been ordered and will be available for Vestry members soon. The retreat will be at the Wilcox's lake house.
- 7. Discernment Committee for Nita Brown:** Nita will be starting discernment, and one Vestry member will need to be on the committee as a Vestry liaison.
- 8. More dates: Women's Retreat September 19-21, Parish Retreat March 6-8: FYI.**

Southwest Border Relief: Nancy Allen. There will be a fundraiser at The Locals in September to raise money for border relief. There is also a website outlining what is needed right now: www.southtexasrefugees.org. This group has asked for space at the church to collect items to send

forward, and the volunteers in this group will oversee donations and sending them on. The Vestry is on board with this effort.

Junior Warden's Report: Scotty Bell. The doors on the parish hall have gotten some weather stripping to bridge the gap. Teri asked that those doors be painted with the same paint that was used at the Morgan House. Ultimately, the doors need to be replaced.

Morgan House storage building: Scotty talked with Dale about what type of building will work, and Dale isn't sure if we are able to do that because of Conway historic district regulations.
