## THE REV. TERI DAILY'S LETTER

Dear St. Peter's,

Ash Wednesday (March 1<sup>st</sup>) marks the beginning of Lent. The Lenten journey is one of transformation, and it is so in two ways. First, during the season of Lent we relive in our liturgical life (our worship) Jesus' journey to Jerusalem - to the cross and, ultimately, the resurrection. Second, Lent is the time when we as Christians reflect upon that which needs to die in our own lives so that we can be re-born more fully into the likeness of Christ. Scripture is full of symbols or metaphors for this journey of transformation, and so I'd like to invite you to join me in a Lenten practice of immersing ourselves in the biblical metaphors-allowing them to be our spiritual guides during this season of transformation. You can take part in any or all of the following prayer resources offered each week in Lent:



- 1) Each week a particular biblical metaphor for transformation will be taken from gospel reading for that Sunday and explored in depth. On Monday morning, two biblical passages which make use of that symbol will be emailed to the congregation; one passage will be the gospel reading itself, the other being another passage from scripture. An introduction to that metaphor will be provided in the email, along with brief suggestions on the Ignatian method of praying with scripture (entering into the narratives ourselves) and prompts for reflection.
- 2) A photo or representation of a painting pertaining to that week's metaphor will be included in the email, along with instructions on the ancient practice of visio divina (or Sacred Looking).
- 3) Each week a prayer station will be available in the side chapel, allowing that week's biblical metaphor to be internalized through bodily movement and prayer.
- 4) The brief Lenten meditation provided at the weekly soup suppers (Wednesdays at 5:30 pm) will center on that week's biblical symbol.
- 5) Our Wednesday evening Eucharist during Lent will be what is commonly known as a "Rite III" service, with various readings, poems, and scriptures organized around the metaphor for the week. The readings and poetry will come from ancient and contemporary Christian writers.

Please don't worry if you do not have access to email. We will also have the scriptures for Ignatian prayer and images for Sacred Looking available on Sunday mornings and in the side chapel throughout the week.

We live in a world where we are taught to be skeptical and to privilege mind over heart. Therefore, it may take practice to allow ourselves to be vulnerable to the work of the Holy Spirit when we pray the scriptures. Only through such vulnerability, though, can our hearts be transformed. So I invite you to open your heart this Lent and listen to the Holy Spirit at work through the rich and powerful images in scripture.

Hoping your journey through Lent leads you to new life in ways you never imagined,

## THE REV. PEGGY CROMWELL'S NOTE

Last week, Liz and I were traveling for her business. We happened to be in Phoenix. On the cab ride from the airport to the hotel, we met Reza, an elderly man from - as he put it - "Persia." He told us he had been in the United States for 38 years. His name and that time reference probably means that he was named for the Shah of Iran, Reza Pahlavi, and that he left his home country in 1979 during the overthrow of the Shah's dynasty by Islamic forces led by the Ayatollah Khomeini.

I expected Reza to talk about how much he missed his country, but he didn't. Almost immediately he said, "It doesn't matter where you are from, your home is where you are." It reminded me of a quote by Maya Angelou: "I long, as does every human being, to be at home wherever I find myself." I know I may never see Reza again, but for that few moments in his cab, we shared a "home" - full of compassion and understanding. He helped Liz in and out of the cab as gently as a loving uncle. As I shook his hand at our parting, I could only say, "Take care."

In these days full of talk of bans, detentions, and deportations, let us try to remember that the vast majority of people who were not native born in this country are here merely trying to be at home wherever they find themselves. Let us try to remember Paul's words to the Hebrews: "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it" (13:2).

## JERUSALEM GREER'S NOTE

### ***Mixed Tables for Lent***

***"One of the biggest mistakes the church has made on my generation's watch (the Boomers) is the setting of separate tables for different age groups." - Leonard Sweet***

This Lent, we are going to try and rectify this mistake. This Lent we, the St. Peter's Family, is going to sit together at mixed-age tables.

And here is why: Recently, the Fuller Youth Institute reported that 40 to 50 percent of youth group graduates are leaving the Church. At best, half of those might - a strong "might" here - return later in life. Pew Research concluded one-third of millennials have no religious affiliation.

It's not just that young people are leaving OUR church, it's that they are leaving *all* church.

Recently my friend Melissa Cooper, a UMC Deacon and expert in the field of Intergenerational church work, [began a two-part series](#) on this issue, and is in the process of writing a book on the same topic.

Melissa says that what research has found, is that the churches that are growing and healthy, are churches where everyone - all people, all ages, all demographics, - are growing at the same rate in an interconnected fashion.



And what are the practices that those churches are using to grow, and what is the uniting thread between them all?

Relationships.

Research has found that all the methods that work require *relationship*. And not the kind of relationships you might think. Here is some of what Melissa wrote:

*And not just relationship with youth pastors or children's ministry volunteers, but relationship with the whole church-for both inclusiveness in the church's programs and operations, as well as developing leadership-relationships are essential.*

*Young people learn to worship God by being present when the community is worshipping. Young people learn to lead by working alongside leaders. Young people find their passions and callings when those of us more chronologically advanced get to know them and recognize giftings in them that they might not see for themselves. Relationships are key, especially relationships across generations.*

*Research from the Search Institute-a Minneapolis nonprofit and pioneer in using social science research to understand the beliefs and values of young people-recommends that every young person should have a minimum of five unrelated adults in relationship with them. Our churches should be able to meet that quota with little work at all!*

**More and more, we're seeing both in theory and in practice, the answer for many of the church's current and future challenges come in the form of intergenerational relationships.**

During Lent, I am inviting you to come and sit at mixed tables on Wednesday nights from 5:30-6:30. We are going to eat soup and bread, listen to the words of Jesus, and begin to form relationships beyond our comfort zones. Kids and adults, teenagers and seniors, retirees and new moms. If you wonder this experience is for you, or if you are even needed, just ask yourself these questions:

Do I want our youth (or my child) to be a part of the Church even after high school?

Do I want to be a part of a growing healthy body?

Can I eat soup?

If you answered YES to any of these questions, then the Lenten Soup Supper experience *is* for you! Hurrah! I cannot wait to see you there!



## ANNOUNCEMENTS AND EVENTS

### The Great Litany

It is the custom at St. Peter's, and is the custom in many Episcopal Churches to use The Great Litany on the First Sunday of Lent. The Great Litany is the first piece of the liturgy translated and published in English, prepared by Archbishop of Canterbury Thomas Cranmer in 1544 for use in all English churches at a time when England was at war with France and Scotland. He drew on Medieval litanies as well as on Luther's litany from 1529 and a Greek Orthodox version.

Litanies of this sort were commonly used during public processions from the earliest centuries of Christianity. The Great Litany will be chanted at the 11 am service and spoken at the 7:30 am and 9 am services.


