## THE REV. ROBERT C. BROWN

Robert Charles Brown, know more widely as Bob, was ordained a transitional deacon on April 1. Bob graduated from the Iona Institute of Arkansas, a program sponsored by the Diocese of Arkansas, in conjunction with the Seminary of the Southwest in Texas, to prepare clergy locally. Bob is tentatively scheduled to be ordained to the priesthood in early October. As you know, Bishop Benfield appointed Bob as Interim Vicar at St. Peter's where he will serve during the search for a new rector.

"This is a very high honor and privilege for me to serve at St. Peter's, where I did two years of internship. I know that the Holy Spirit has moved in this congregation, and that God has more good work in store for the wonderful people of St. Peter's," said Bob. He continued, "This is one of the premier congregations in the diocese, and the staff here is great."

Bob has been married to Jill since 1968, and they have three adult children and five grandchildren. Prior to Iona and St. Peter's, Bob served for 21 years as President of Arkansas Tech University. Bob also served as faculty member and administrator at six different institutions over a 40 plus year career in higher education. He graduated from Northwestern State University of Louisiana, and earned the M.A. and Ph.D. in economics from Louisiana State University. Bob and Jill have been active members at All Saints Church in Russellville, where Jill continues to serve on the Vestry. They reside in Russellville.

## THE REV. PEGGY CROMWELL

It's been a year since Bishop Benfield placed his hands on my head and prayed to God to "give your Holy Spirit to [me]; fill [me] with grace and power, and make [me] a deacon in your Church...Make [me], O Lord, modest and humble, strong and constant, to observe the discipline of Christ. Let [my] life and teaching so reflect your commandments, that through [me] many may come to know you and love you. As your Son came not to be served but to serve, may this deacon share in Christ's service...."

I'm very grateful to have spent my first year with you at St Peter's. I couldn't have been sent to a better place to "cut my clerical teeth." I feel as though I've been here for a much longer time. You accepted me and embraced me and made me feel comfortable in spite of my inexperience. I think I have been able to thrive as a deacon thanks both to your support as a congregation and, of course, to Teri Daily's leadership and wisdom.

As we continue to move forward through this time of transition, I know you will support Bob and Linda as you have supported me. My prayer is that God will be with us all as we seek to do His will here at St Peter's and the world.

## THE REV. LINDA BROWN

Richard Rohr, one of my favorite authors, and spiritual directors says that he asks God to give him one deed of humiliation each day. "Make me humble, Lord" has often also been my prayer, but to ask for a definitive action each day that will remind me that I am lowly and can never come close to the humility that Jesus had and showed, is asking for something I may not want. Even so, I have decided to take this prayer on as my daily request.

Well, I believe my 'gift' from God to remind me of my own need for humility came on Wednesday night at the Healing/blessing portion of the service. I had stated to my colleagues that I wanted to be the minister who would lay my hands on each person coming to the rail and ask for the Lord's blessing and healing power to come upon them. Surely the Holy Spirit would walk me through this!

I had memorized the healing prayer (I thought), but wanted the Prayer Book close by to have as my back up. Well, I tried putting the PB on the altar rail, but stumbled through the first two or three people because I couldn't read it and was afraid to rely on my memory. It reminded me of trying to learn to ride a bike but not wanting to let go of the training wheels. Eventually, one of the other ministers held the PB up closer to these eyes of mine so I could see plainly what I should be saying.

Humiliation was clear and abundant. But the true gift from God was showing me that He is present, regardless, through the love and support of the people of St. Peter's. They showed their love and trust that the Holy Spirit was with all of us, by gently helping me and loving me with their embraces. I am grateful everyday for St. Peter's Episcopal Church.

## KAREN MCNUTT, SENIOR WARDEN

As Senior Warden, I have the opportunity to help lead our parish through this time of transition in our Clergy Leadership. Wonderful things are happening on a daily basis at 925 Mitchell Street, and as school starts back, our fall programs will begin, and the sound of kids going back to school will fill the neighborhood. The Labyrinth Walk will be used to show the exciting things that are going on, and also to show the areas of opportunity that our Parish has as we plan our next steps in searching for a new Rector. I'm very thankful for strong and steady presence of our staff.

One thing that is top of mind for me personally, during our time of transition, is our Operating Budget. On average, St. Peter's needs \$ 8830.00 per week to pay our normal operating expenses. Our August operating budget is \$35,322. This portion of our overall budget supports the day to day functions that keep our Parish running as smoothly as possible, and, also for those in the community who need us. We will be giving more updates on our budgetary wins and opportunities through the Labyrinth Walk.

## **Back 2 School Sunday**


*Make your ways known to me, Lord; teach me your paths. Lead me in your truth-teach it to me-because you are the God who saves me.*

## Violence Divine:

### Overcoming the Bible's Betrayal of Its Non-Violent God

A Roman Catholic monk for nineteen years and a priest for twelve years, Crossan is a former co-chair of the Jesus Seminar and chair of the Historical Jesus Section of the Society of Biblical Literature.

The meeting was opened with a prayer led by the Rev Teri Dailey.

A motion to approve the May minutes was made by Marilyn Larson and seconded by Chris Odom.

The Finance Committee report was given by Teri Dailey and Karen McNutt. A motion was made to approve by LeighAnn Warriner and seconded by Jane Harris.

Jerusalem Greer gave the Family Ministries Report. Jerusalem shared a program update and provided information and pictures with ideas for a playground update.

Chris Odom shared the Junior Warden's Report. June was a busy month for John Churchwell and Chris.

- An adjuster from Church Insurance came onsite and reviewed the wind and hail damage to the sanctuary roof. They will be paying St. Peters \$19,339.88 towards replacement cost of a new roof. Once repairs are complete and we submit the invoice they will mail an additional \$3,859.58 to the church.
- 3 bids were submitted for the roof replacement. A motion was made by Marilyn Larson to accept PI Roofing's bid to complete the work. Motion was seconded by Sam Buchanan. Cost for the new roof will be \$22,362.00.
- Kordsmeier Remodeling is submitting bids to modify the doors in the Lobby and Sanctuary to make the area more open, inviting, and energy efficient when the front doors are open. The project will be funded using Memorial Funds.
- Improved drainage in the Columbarium is still an ongoing project.

The Rector's report was given by Teri Daily.

- Michaelene Miller is in her 3<sup>rd</sup> and final year at seminary. She and Teri will be working on a liturgy project this summer.
- Teri thanked Tracy Simpson for leading the group that hosted the Father's Day Brunch.
- Teri gave the Vestry a wonderful overview of program and transition items to keep in mind in the coming months.

Karen McNutt gave the Senior Warden's report.

- Kelley King is stepping down as Vestry Secretary. Many thanks to Kelley for the great work she did and the time she invested with us.
- The vestry will be meeting with Bob and Jill Brown on Sunday, June 4<sup>th</sup>, for a round table. We're looking forward to the opportunity to spend time with them.
- The Vestry discussed Teri's separation package. A motion was made and seconded that we keep Teri's compensation package whole through August 30, 2017.
