Rev. Teri Daily's Letter

From the Peter's Pence Archives

This article was originally published in the September 2011 edition of Peter's Pence.

Dear St. Peter's Church Family,

Labor Day has taken on many meanings as the years have gone by. When I was young it marked the last day of wearing white patent leather shoes—from the next day until Easter the shoes had to be black. When I became school-aged, Labor Day marked the time after which my classmates who worked in tobacco on the farms would no longer be excused from school to help out their families. (Until the Tuesday after Labor Day, working on a family farm was an acceptable reason to miss school in rural North Carolina.) As an adult, Labor Day comes as a welcome break from the work routine. And of course, Labor Day carries with it parties, time with family, weekend getaways, and lots of relaxation (although sometimes the first three on this list may seem incompatible with the last).

It appears that we may have lost the core meaning of Labor Day in the 117 years since it was established as a federal holiday. In the late 19th century, the Labor Movement in America struggled to bring to the forefront of American consciousness the unsafe working conditions, the long hours required of workers, and the inadequate wages offered by companies. Twelve hour days, worked seven days a week, by workers who were often merely children, in unsanitary conditions with little to no breaks—it was all part of a reality that much of the American population preferred remain hidden. On September 5, 1882, 10,000 workers in New York City took unpaid time from work and processed from City Hall to Union Square—it was the first Labor Day parade and helped to bring the sometimes invisible plight of American workers squarely into view.

But sitting at my desk in the twenty-first century, I wonder if most of us haven't lost touch once more with those who labor to make our life what it is. Let's face it, we purchase products in nicely wrapped cellophane packages from large stores—never coming face to face with the farmer who grows the food, the person who weaves or runs the machine that weaves the fabric we wear, or the designers and marketers who are responsible for seeing that the an item is produced, transported, and sold. In today's world, it is all too easy to see something we buy as only an object, instead of as the work of many hands and lives. So, on Labor Day, maybe it's worth stopping in the midst of our celebrations, travels, and relaxing to remember that our lives are irrevocably bound up in one another, that our good depends on the toil and care of others, that our lives are not nearly as individual and separate as they often seem.

Almighty God, you have so linked our lives one with another that all we do affects, for good or ill, all other lives: So guide us in the work we do, that we may do it not for self alone, but for the common good; and, as we seek a proper return for our own labor, make us mindful of the rightful aspirations of other workers, and arouse our concern for those who are out of work; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Class will study How Jesus Became God consisting of 24 video lectures by Bart Ehrman, Distinguished Professor of New Testament at The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, followed by discussion. "The entire story of how Jesus became God is of paramount importance to everyone with the slightest interest in religion or history. If Jesus had not been declared God at his resurrection, his followers would have remained a small sect within Judaism whose leader ended up on the wrong side of the law & was crucified for his efforts. The massive conversion of Gentiles to belief in Christ would have never happened. Centuries

later, the Roman emperor would never have been converted. The Roman Empire would have never adopted Christian beliefs and ways. The Middle Ages, the Renaissance, the Reformation, and modernity as we know it would have never transpired. And most of us would still be pagan. It is for this reason that there are indeed few questions in the entire history of civilization as important as this one. How did Jesus become God?"

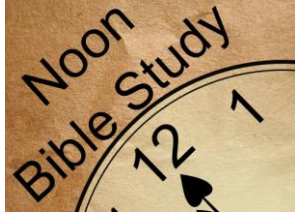
Appreciative Inquiry

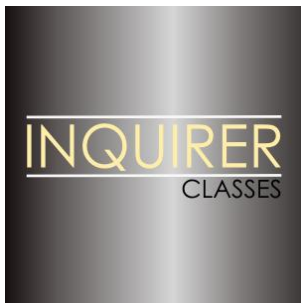
Help Camp Mitchell

Praying with the Body: The Practice of Prayer and Yoga

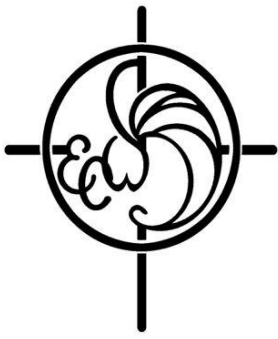

Hello All,

It has certainly been nice to walk outside recently and enjoy some cooler weather. Let's hope it stays around for a while!

I'm reaching out to you all again this month to express the need for your continued monetary donations. As of today, the food pantry has around \$1,000 in available funds that can be used to purchase food for the families who utilize our pantry each month. We do have some reserve from money collected last year for the Thanksgiving baskets, which we will move over and use for the pantry. But we still need monthly donations from you so that we can continue to provide this service to our community. Our monthly food purchases average \$1,300 and that allows us to provide staples for around 200 families each month. Please remember the pantry when you go grocery shopping or you consider donating to a charitable organization.

Thank you to the volunteers who reached out after my request for help with food pickups and packing. I have someone now helping with the Greater Pleasant and Conway Locally Grown pickups. We do still need help with the Arkansas Food Bank pickups if you're willing and able. Those food runs do require you to have a truck that can carry around 800 pounds of food. And you will need to be able to unload boxes into the pantry for each pickup. If you are interested, please let me know.

I wanted to say thank you to everyone who volunteered for the pancake fundraiser this weekend! It was a huge success! We had a great turnout of people from the church as well as others in the community and all of your hard work paid off.

If my calculations are correct, it looks like after paying the fee to Stoby's for the use of their restaurant - the pantry raised \$1,280!!! I think that's more than the pancake fundraiser has ever made...at least while I've been involved with the pantry. So thank you all for continuing to give to the pantry...whether it's monetary or food donations or volunteering your time on Saturdays, picking up food or volunteering for special events to help raise funds for the pantry. Everything you all do allows us to provide this service to families who need it.
