The Rev. Teri Daily's Letter

Dear St. Peter's,

Last month we celebrated the Rev. Peggy Cromwell's first Sunday as deacon of St. Peter's. We are so excited to share in ministry with her!

Our catechism in the *Book of Common Prayer* describes the ministry of a deacon in the following way: "The ministry of a deacon is to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as a servant to those in need; and to assist bishops and priests in the proclamation of the Gospel and the administration of the sacraments" (BCP, page 856). The phrase *servant to those in need* is what most identifies a deacon in the Church. (In fact, the biblical Greek word *diakonia*, from which we derive "deacon," means "service.") Peggy will indeed *serve* among us. She will prepare the altar and serve communion; she will serve in our college ministry, supporting our college students and being a presence in their lives; she will serve those who are in need of pastoral care (whether it be due to illness, loneliness, aging, or other reason) through the Community of Hope program here at St. Peter's. And she will preach and teach among us, as well as laugh and mourn with all of us at various times in our parish life.

In doing all this, Peggy will call *us* to Christian servanthood as well. For the role of a deacon is not to do such work in our place (i.e., *instead of us*), but to remind us that participating in Christ's work of reconciliation among those who are in need is a vital aspect of the ministry of each one of us.

I am grateful to Peggy for the ministry we will all share – the ways we will share God's love with those in Conway and beyond.

From the service for the Ordination of a Deacon in the Book of Common Prayer:

"As a deacon in the Church, you are to study the Holy Scriptures, to seek nourishment from them, and to model your life upon them. You are to make Christ and his redemptive love known, by your word and example, to those among whom you live, and work, and worship. You are to interpret to the Church the needs, concerns, and hopes of the world. You are to assist the bishop and priests in public worship and in the ministration of God's Word and Sacraments, and you are to carry out other duties assigned to you from time to time. At all times, your life and teaching are to show Christ's people that in serving the helpless they are serving Christ himself."

Jerusalem's Note

Observing Holy Cross Day – September 14

For me, Holy Cross Day and the Red Cross organization will forever be linked. Holy Cross Day is a day for remembering the tactile form and use of the cross itself and a day for the Church to be inspired to live and serve in tactile, radical ways ourselves – serving as Christ hands and feet in the world in the most torn apart places. When my parents' home was destroyed by a tornado on March 1, 1997, both the Church and the Red Cross showed up to help. Below is an excerpt from the Holy Cross Day chapter in my book *A Homemade Year: The Blessings of Cooking, Crafting and Coming Together*:

After two weeks the inevitable post-disaster rhythm of how a town restores itself took over, but during the first few days everyone moved in a series of fits and starts. The shock and disorientation of what we had collectively lived through could bring everything to a halt, and yet in the next moment the practical needs of cleaning up the wreckage, eating, drinking, and sleeping would prod us forward again, pushing us further down the path of recovery. Despite the put-one-foot-in-front-of-the-other, can-do attitude, the realities of the tornado's damage were still clearly evident. National Guardsmen set up camps on the corners of the streets and neighborhoods most affected and during the day, rolling slowly down each battered street, and the Red Cross van would come to visit—its bright red emblem of hope on a pristine white background in stark contrast to the dirty gray and now treeless neighborhoods. The popularity of the Red Cross van in those weeks could rival that of an ice cream man delivering free swirl cones on a hot summer day, but instead of sweet treats this van brought water, bandages, and most of all comfort and hope that all would be well again. Thinking back to those Red Cross vans and their emblem, I wonder if my life carries the markers of another cross meant to bring hope.

Holy Cross Day is a good time to stop and reflect on the places where the light of Christ' love and hope are needed most. Here are a few ways that you can observe this day at home:

Reflection:

Open your time together or in private meditation by reading the collect of the day -

Collect for the Day:

Almighty God, whose Son our Savior Jesus Christ was lifted high upon the cross that he might draw the

whole world to himself: Mercifully grant that we, who glory in the mystery of our redemption, may have grace to take up our cross and follow him; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.

Next, consider spending some time reflecting, as a family or by yourself, on what destroyed and damaged place or places - perhaps in your neighborhood, school, workplace, church, or the world at large, that the Holy Spirit may be leading you or your family to take the healing light of Christ to.

Consider lighting a candle or passing the Blessing Cup as you each name a place in your life or the world that needs healing and hope. Close your time by reading the gospel.

Scripture Reading:

John 12:31-36a

Jesus said, "Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die. The crowd answered him, "We have heard from the law that the Messiah remains forever. How can you say that the Son of Man must be lifted up? Who is this Son of Man?" Jesus said to them, "The light is with you for a little longer. Walk while you have the light, so that the darkness may not overtake you. If you walk in the darkness, you do not know where you are going. While you have the light, believe in the light, so that you may become children of light."

A little background on "the new deacon"

So now I find myself in the most unlikely of situations - a real deacon in an Episcopal congregation. It's been a long time coming, but this part of the journey is just beginning. I thought you might like to know what I hope to bring to this "job."

First, I am a good communicator - as a speaker, a writer, and a listener. I am comfortable speaking to groups large or small. I am even more comfortable listening - which may be the more valuable skill, particularly in clerical ministry. This trait is crucial for working with others. I also try to be a good collaborator. I listen, I defer when appropriate, but I also understand that the point of collaboration is to get something done. I have no problem talking things out, seeing all sides and/or possibilities, and then deciding on a plan of action and setting it in motion.

Second, I do my level best to treat all comers with courtesy and respect. Early on, I was taught that courtesy and a cheerful manner convey a sense of respect, which is a prerequisite for effective communication. Being positive usually - though not always - helps others to respond in kind. It has been helpful to me in getting others to pitch in when something needs to be done. I find that if I jump into a task with a good attitude, others will follow.

From respect should flow compassion; even a little human kindness can do much to counteract the ills of the world. The golden rule directs me to treat others as I would be treated - with kindness, with generosity, with consideration. This means weighing the possible effect of what I say or do on others. I try always to think about the impact of my words and actions on others, and I try to think of others' concerns before my own. A friend of mine once accused me of contriving a response because I hesitated before answering her question. I would prefer to pause a moment and find the best words rather than blurt out something that might be hurtful or misconstrued.

To me, compassion pairs naturally and comfortably with service. Each of us has an obligation, I believe, to help those in need - whether those needs be economic, social, or spiritual. Service is more than an obligation to me though; it really makes me happy to know that I've helped someone. Whether I'm serving at church or delivering meals on wheels or helping a student with a paper, I derive satisfaction from knowing that I have done something helpful for someone else.

I'm so excited to be a part of the good things going on at St. Peter's! I am very grateful for the warm welcome you have given me, and I look forward to working with you.

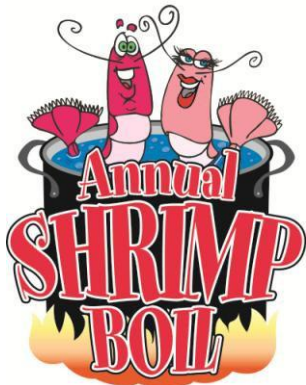

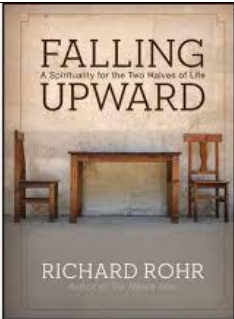

Youth Confirmation

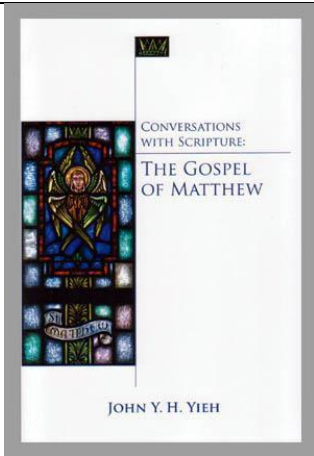
Confirmation classes are generally given in the fall before the Bishop's visit (this year on October 9,) and occasionally in the spring, as needed. Rev. Teri Daily leads these classes, which include a study of church history, the meaning of Scripture, the Sacraments of the Episcopal Church, the role of prayer in the life of a Christian and personal faith. Along with the classes, we also try to arrange trips so that students can experience other places of worship such as non-denominational churches and the Temple B'nai Israel.

Youth ages 12 - 17 are eligible for Youth Confirmation. Confirmation is a sacramental rite in which the candidates "express a mature commitment to Christ, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop" (BCP, p. 860). Those who were baptized at an early age and those baptized as adults without laying on of hands by a bishop are expected to make a mature public affirmation of their faith, recommit themselves to the responsibilities of their baptism, and receive laying on of hands by a bishop (BCP, p. 412).
