### A Labyrinth Memo

#### *A little background on "the new deacon"*

So now I find myself in the most unlikely of situations - a real deacon in an Episcopal congregation. It's been a long time coming, but this part of the journey is just beginning. I thought you might like to know what I hope to bring to this "job."

First, I am a good communicator - as a speaker, a writer, and a listener. I am comfortable speaking to groups large or small. I am even more comfortable listening - which may be the more valuable skill, particularly in clerical ministry. This trait is crucial for working with others. I also try to be a good collaborator. I listen, I defer when appropriate, but I also understand that the point of collaboration is to get something done. I have no problem talking things out, seeing all sides and/or possibilities, and then deciding on a plan of action and setting it in motion.

Second, I do my level best to treat all comers with courtesy and respect. Early on, I was taught that courtesy and a cheerful manner convey a sense of respect, which is a prerequisite for effective communication. Being positive usually - though not always - helps others to respond in kind. It has been helpful to me in getting others to pitch in when something needs to be done. I find that if I jump into a task with a good attitude, others will follow.

From respect should flow compassion; even a little human kindness can do much to counteract the ills of the world. The golden rule directs me to treat others as I would be treated - with kindness, with generosity, with consideration. This means weighing the possible effect of what I say or do on others. I try always to think about the impact of my words and actions on others, and I try to think of others' concerns before my own. A friend of mine once accused me of contriving a response because I hesitated before answering her question. I would prefer to pause a moment and find the best words rather than blurt out something that might be hurtful or misconstrued.

To me, compassion pairs naturally and comfortably with service. Each of us has an obligation, I believe, to help those in need - whether those needs be economic, social, or spiritual. Service is more than an obligation to me though; it really makes me happy to know that I've helped someone. Whether I'm serving at church or delivering meals on wheels or helping a student with a paper, I derive satisfaction from knowing that I have done something helpful for someone else.


I'm so excited to be a part of the good things going on at St. Peter's! I am very grateful for the warm welcome you have given me, and I look forward to working with you.



In *Falling Upward*, Fr. 

## **Youth Confirmation**

Confirmation classes are generally given in the fall before the Bishop's visit (this year on October 9,) and occasionally in the spring, as needed. Rev. Teri Daily leads these classes, which include a study of church history, the meaning of Scripture, the Sacraments of the Episcopal Church, the role of prayer in the life of a Christian and personal faith. Along with the classes, we also try to arrange trips so that students can experience other places of worship such as non-denominational churches and the Temple B'nai Israel.

Youth ages 12 - 17 are eligible for Youth Confirmation. Confirmation is a

sacramental rite in which the candidates "express a mature commitment to Christ, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop" (BCP, p. 860). Those who were baptized at an early age and those baptized as adults without laying on of hands by a bishop are expected to make a mature public affirmation of their faith, recommit themselves to the responsibilities of their baptism, and receive laying on of hands by a bishop (BCP, p. 412).

## Pantry Musings

In 2010 Greg Rickel, former Vicar of St. Peter's now a Bishop of Olympia, was featured in a video recorded during the meeting of the House of Bishops in Douglas, Arizona. Greg's comments focused on the differences between the border of Washington and Canada where he lives and the border of one of the poorest places in the world Sonora, Mexico and Douglas, Arizona. Greg noted that not far from his home in Washington there is an arch that people from Canada and the United States may walk freely through between countries. But in Douglas, Arizona, there is a low wall between the United States and Mexico. It is around seven feet high, if I remember Greg correctly, it is a monster to cross. The dignity and respect which are granted to persons from Canada are not granted to residents in Sonora, Mexico. Greg, pictured at the border between Douglas, Arizona and Agua Prieta, Sonora, Mexico noted that here persons seek to enforce immigration laws fostering resistance, anger, violence, and disrespect of persons. Racism, he commented, certainly played a role in the absence of respect. I would add that poverty, dress, bodily odors, and sometimes cleanliness all add to our refusal to grant the other, who is our neighbor, dignity and respect. Most importantly, cultural, including language differences, create an unrecognized and unacknowledged wall. This issue is persistent and has become a very serious human rights issue in the economic and political arenas today. The economies of Texas, Arizona, California and Sonora are intertwined to such an extent that they cannot exist independently. To deny us access to each other is preposterous and self destructive. I spent a number of my formative years in Douglas. I remember that during WWII we were able to buy sugar, vegetables and meat across the border. Ration cards were not required. More than that many agricultural workers came to the growing regions of our country and provide labor that few of us will tackle because it is long, hot, and hard work. Many come as day laborers. Some work in the mines. Still others come to make a new home, go to school, and mix their rich culture with our rich culture. It is an interesting and exciting place to live. -Ann Drake

### First Reading

Deuteronomy 30:15-20

Moses said to all Israel the words which the Lord commanded him, "See, I have set before you today life and prosperity, death and adversity. If you obey the commandments of them Lord your God that I am commanding you today, by loving the Lord your God, walking in his ways, and observing his commandments, decrees, and ordinances, then you shall live and become numerous, and the Lord your God will bless you in the land that you are entering to possess. But if your heart turns away and you do not hear, but are led astray to bow down to other gods and serve them, I declare to you today that you shall perish; you shall not live long in the land that you are crossing the Jordan to enter and possess. I call heaven and earth to witness against you today that I have set before you life and death, blessings and curses. Choose life so that you and your descendants may live, loving the Lord your God, obeying him, and holding fast to him; for that means life to you and length of days, so that you may live in the land that the Lord swore to give to your ancestors, to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob."

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

When I remember you in my prayers, I always thank my God because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith toward the Lord Jesus. I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective when you perceive all the good that we may do for Christ. I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother.

For this reason, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do your duty, yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love-- and I, Paul, do this as an old man, and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful both to you and to me. I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. I wanted to keep him with me, so that he might be of service to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel; but I preferred to do nothing without your consent, in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back forever, no longer as a slave but more than a slave, a beloved brother-- especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord.

So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as you would welcome me. If he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say.
