


**Falling Upward: A Spirituality for the Two Halves of Life**

In Falling Upward, Fr. ## Pantry Musings

I recall the minister of the Charleston, S. C, Mother Emanuel, A. M. E, saying on a news program that forgiveness after all is an intellectual activity, not an emotional one. Her observation was made in response to a news person's questions about the ready forgiveness of the persons who had witness the mass shootings at the church during a Bible study. The shooter was a white man who had come to their church with the apparent intent of killing someone. When I think about it I think she has a point. But, I am inclined to think that there is more to forgiveness then that or we would not be so resistant to forgive. When I can reach the point of being able to consider the other and the possibility of his or her pain, I may be truly able to forgive. It is very difficult to empathize with the other, to put myself in their shoes. Empathy is not an easy activity for any of us. It is much easier to project emotion, my perception of their behavior onto the other thus blaming them for their behavior. Yet, it is important to honor the other's feelings, recognizing them for what they are. It is tempting to want to tell the other what we think their motives are. When someone does this to me, I know that there is no forgiveness coming from me to them or to me from them. All possibilities of communication are blocked. This is a painful process for me because I have trouble admitting that the other's behavior may have a source other than my perception founded in my own pain and anger. Often it may mean going back through the earlier steps of identifying the problem, confronting the other, and forgiving ourselves in order to come to a point of recognizing the other's pain and empathizing with them.--- Ann Drake

Join us Sunday, October 2, at 9AM for The Blessing of the Animals Eucharist, in honor of the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi.


We will meet on the lawn behind the parish hall a little before 9am. The service (which will include Eucharist) will begin at 9.)

## Liturgical Readings for Sunday, September 11, 2016

*The 9:00am Service will read 1 Timothy and lead the Psalm.*

### First Reading

Exodus 32:7-14

The Lord said to Moses, "Go down at once! Your people, whom you brought up out of the land of Egypt, have acted perversely; they have been quick to turn aside from the way that I commanded them; they have cast for themselves an image of a calf, and have worshiped it and sacrificed to it, and said, 'These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!'" The Lord said to Moses, "I have seen this people, how stiff-necked they are. Now let me alone, so that my wrath may burn hot against them and I may consume them; and of you I will make a great nation."

But Moses implored the Lord his God, and said, "O Lord, why does your wrath burn hot against your people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt with great power and with a mighty hand? Why should the Egyptians say, 'It was with evil intent that he brought them out to kill them in the mountains, and to consume them from the face of the earth'? Turn from your fierce wrath; change your mind and do not bring disaster on your people. Remember Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, your servants, how you swore to them by your own self, saying to them, 'I will multiply your descendants like the stars of heaven, and all this land that I have promised I will give to your descendants, and they shall inherit it forever.'" And the Lord changed his mind about the disaster that he planned to bring on his people.

I am grateful to Christ Jesus our Lord, who has strengthened me, because he judged me faithful and appointed me to his service, even though I was formerly a blasphemer, a persecutor, and a man of violence. But I received mercy because I had acted ignorantly in unbelief, and the grace of our Lord overflowed for me with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. The saying is sure and worthy of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners-- of whom I am the foremost. But for that very reason I received mercy, so that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display the utmost patience, making me an example to those who would come to believe in him for eternal life. To the King of the ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen.
